31 BAY AREA ORGANIZATIONS JOIN SJMA IN FESTIVAL OF FOOD AND THE ARTS

SAN JOSE, California (August 2013) — The San Jose Museum of Art's multidisciplinary exhibition *Around the Table: food, creativity, community* (November 9, 2013 – April 20, 2014) will also serve as a catalyst for a community-wide festival of food, the arts, and ideas. SJMA has gone far beyond the museum's walls to partner with 31 arts and community organizations in the Bay Area—an epicenter of agriculture and "foodie" culture. A coordinated series of thought-provoking programs will investigate and stimulate dialogue around a broad range of topics related to food. Presenting projects by local farmers, artists, designers, architects, performers, and activists, the collaboration both celebrates food and examines critical issues such as health and nutrition, food justice, food as cultural identity and community, local agricultural history, and the environment. Highlights include visits to farms, performance art and theater, and edible plantings downtown.

- The San Jose Museum of Quilts & Textiles offers the exhibitions Tasty! Food Inspired Quilts (July 31 October 27, 2013) and Tasty, Too! Food Inspired Quilts (January 29, 2014 April 27, 2014).
 Both exhibitions will showcase quilts, historical and contemporary, inspired by foods we love to eat. Details of a food-inspired quilt challenge can be found on the museum's website.

- 18 Reasons, San Francisco, will host three consecutive exhibitions: War Gastronomy: Recipes of Relocation, August 9 October 7, 2013; Charles Papillo: Grocery List Identities, October 10 December 2, 2013; and Sasha Duerr: Local Color, December 6, 2013 January 27, 2014. (www.18reasons.org)

- Valley Verde, San Jose, has commissioned a large, hand-made planter box (designed by local woodworking artist Rory Fukuda, Raul Lozano, and ceramic artist Franciso Pancho Jimenez).
 Located in the outdoor seating area of Café Too! at SJMA (September 2013 April 2014), it will be planted with winter vegetables and harvested for use in the café.
- Bibliophilia, an exhibition featuring work by artists who are united by their love of books and libraries will take place at the Palo Alto Art Center, September 21 December 22, 2013. Exhibiting artists include Patricia Curtain and Christopher Reynolds, who combine their inspiration from food and books together in compelling works. (www.cityofpaloalto.org/artcenter)
- In addition to regular garden and farm tours, and volunteer opportunities, **The Emma Prusch Farm Park Foundation**, San Jose, will offer three special versions of *Learn in the Garden*, a series of hands-on classes offered by certified master gardeners: Winter Vegetables on **September 21**, 10 11 AM; Cover Crops on **October 26**, 10 11 AM; and Preparing Your Garden for Winter on **November 23**, 10 11 AM. - Teatro Vision, San Jose, will present the world premiere of MACARIO, October 10 20, 2013. The bilingual theatrical production is a classic Mexican folktale that explores the many aspects of hunger. Teatro Vision will also present a Gala Opening Event on October 12, a "Pay what you can or pay with a can" food drive on October 13, and "Comer Saludable es un Derecho No Un Privilegio/Healthy Eating is a Right, Not a Privilege!," a forum addressing the topics of hunger and food justice, on October 18, at 6 PM. - Montalvo Arts Center, Saratoga, will present Mountains in My Spoon: Artists and Food at the Lucas Artists Residency, a group exhibition featuring work that deals with food as either a material or theme, October 18, 2013 February 9, 2014. Montalvo plans several other related programs, including an evening of food related readings curated by food writer Andrew Pham (October 25) and a panel discussion in association with the Alliance of Artist Communities' annual conference that will explore the role of food in creative practice (Date TBD). - Movimiento de Arte y Cultura Latino Americana (MACLA), San Jose, will present the exhibition Maize Y Más: From Mother to Monster?, focused on the subject of corn, November I, 2013 February 15, 2014, and three performances: Tortilla Oracle, by artist Jorge Rojas, on November I, 2013, 7 11 PM and November 2, 2013, 12 5 PM; Fat Boy: a hybrid performance that examines American consumerism and wastefulness juxtaposed with world hunger and poverty, November 15 17, 2013; and Love, Food, Love, by Robert Karimi on February 14, 2014. - Santa Clara County Farm Bureau, Morgan Hill, will host a fall farm-to-fork fundraiser in San Martin on November 2, 2013. The Farm Bureau is also collaborating with artist Chelsea Wills to produce Still There, an audio recording of interviews with farmers and a map focused on bio and cultural diversity in local farming, which will be included in Around the Table at the San Jose Museum of Art, November 9, 2013 April 20, 2014. - In addition to their weekly, lost-cost, year-round farm stand, **Veggielution Community Farm**, San Jose, will present *Art in the Garden*, a monthly series of free, participatory art events and exhibitions for all ages and skill levels, on the first Saturday of every month from **November 2**, **2013 through April 5**, **2014**. **Veggielution** is also collaborating with SJMA on the arts and science education initiative, Sowing Creativity. - San Jose Institute of Contemporary Art will present two projects: Eating Disorders in a Disordered Culture, by Robin Lasser, a video project exploring the personal, cultural and historical dimensions of eating disorders; and The Schauss Kitchen by Christopher Reynolds, a piece that investigates how consumers are both consciously and subconsciously conditioned to indulge in (or refrain from) gastronomic pleasures. Both programs will run November 9 December 21, 2013. (www.sjica.org)
- de Saisset Museum at Santa Clara University will host From Acorns to Apple, a community-based mural project that traces the rich history of food and innovation in Santa Clara Valley, January 10 March 16, 2014. (www.scu.edu/deSaisset)
